The Conditions of Employment for School Teachers specify the general **Duties:**

In addition, certain particular duties are reasonably required to be

exercised and completed in a satisfactory manner.

Main Activities: TEACHER OF THE DEAF

> Responsibility for communicating effectively with a range of deaf learners, using a variety of communication approaches.

- Enabling deaf learners to understand language and concepts through use of appropriate language.
- Promoting deaf learners' expressive skills in spoken sign language in partnership with deaf/hearing colleagues.
- Promoting an enriched language environment which is tuned to the needs of deaf learners.
- Creating contingency, interactive learning and reinforcement within a natural language environment.
- Facilitating speech intelligibility and developing discourse skills.
- Developing expressive and receptive skills which demonstrate practical knowledge of the structure and function of British Sign Language.
- Developing expressive and receptive skills of Signed English or Sign Supported English if appropriate to a given educational setting.

Audiology

Teachers of the Deaf within a school with Enhanced Provision for Hearing Impaired children should:

- Assess competently the residual hearing of children and young people whatever tests are appropriate, together with an ability to interpret the audiometric test results correctly and professionally.
- Use correctly the amplification equipment used by hearing impaired children.

Test and check amplification equipment on a regular basis

Curriculum

Teachers in schools with Enhanced Provision should use their knowledge of the National Curriculum to underpin their work. The Teacher of the Deaf will:

- Create differentiated tasks appropriate to deaf pupils.
- Ensure the communication needs of deaf pupils in spoken delivery, sign support systems and/or British Sign Language are met.
- Deliver the English Curriculum, particularly in reading and written language.
- Plan programmes, including individual education plans, to meet the specific needs of deaf pupils.
- Use diagnostic assessment, including pre-school developmental assessment procedures when necessary.
- Plan the integration of special curricular needs within a whole school approach.

Deaf Specific

The Teacher of the Deaf should demonstrate skills in:

- Relating knowledge of the social, emotional and personal implications of deafness to the teaching and management of deaf children.
- The understanding of the potential consequences of deafness on child development as these relate to language competence and to the effects of sensory deprivation.
- Assist deaf learners in developing a positive identity and high selfesteem

Educational Provision

Have a knowledge of and utilise current legislation, government reports, the history of deaf education and the organisation of school and support services.

Language

Teachers of the Deaf should be competent in applying their knowledge of conventional linguistics and language acquisition in hearing and hearing impaired pupils. This will support their skill in:

- Planning, delivering and evaluating programmes for language and literacy development in deaf children.
- Monitoring and improving the linguistic environment for deaf pupils.

The duties may be varied to meet changed circumstances in a manner compatible with the post held.
